DOG STUNG BY A BEE?

Signs that your dog may have been stung by a bee include yelping, scratching or licking at the site of the sting, and redness. If your dog is stung, try to remove the stinger as quickly as possible. It's important to do this with a flat surface like a credit card. Attempting to remove the stinger with

your fingers or tweezers will likely expose your dog to more venom. For dogs that aren't experiencing any alarming symptoms, a cold compress to reduce an inflammation and some rest is often sufficient.

However, some dogs do suffer from serious allergic reactions to bee stings.

If your dog experiences severe swelling, hives, difficulty breathing, or vomiting, it's important to seek immediate veterinary attention. Allergic reactions can become life threatening in a very short time. Emergency veterinary care typically includes IV fluids and steroid injections.



MARY ANN



A very pregnant Mary Ann was picked up at Chili's by Animal Control and taken to the WCSPCA along with another pregnant cat in labor. An ARF volunteer happened to be there and, since space is always an issue during kitten season, ARF offered to take both cats. Mary Ann was less than a year old. She delivered six kittens on September 18, 2002: (two calicos (Rachel and Rainbow), a black and white (Rascal), two torties (Renee and Raquel), and a mostly white with black markings around his ears (Rambo). Little

Rainbow had health issues and passed away at five weeks.

When Mary Ann and her kittens arrived at ARF from foster care, four of the kittens were adopted right away. Raquel and Mary Ann were very bonded. Evidently Raquel did not wash her face to her mother's satisfaction, so Mary Ann scrubbed her face and ears every afternoon. They enjoyed their "alone time" and retired to the back hall each evening to sleep together.

When Mary Ann was about 6 years old she had a terrible case of bladder stones. Special food and medications did not help. She had surgery to remove the stones and did not have any more problems.

Mary Ann had a strong maternal instinct and could not stand for a child to cry. She would always go over to the

child to see what was wrong. She loved treats, chips and a warm towel from the dryer. She would also talk if you stroked from the back of her neck to the tip of her tail. We always called it "priming the pump".

Mary Ann started losing weight. Her blood tests showed kidney failure as the cause. Two medications and canned food helped for a while until she stopped eating and drinking. Her quality of life had deteriorated significantly. Isolation and IV fluids every three days would have extended her life for a very short time., but we could not let her suffer. Vicki and Laura were with her when she crossed the Rainbow Bridge on May 5th.

Mary Ann was a devoted mother and loyal companion. We all miss her sweet face!


STAR

Star's strength began to fade and we knew we couldn't let him suffer. Kay and Sheila took him to visit Dr. Newby for the last time on May 11th. He passed peacefully and quickly.

If you call, you should be prepared to provide the following information: name of the poison your animal was exposed to, the amount and how long ago; the species, breed, age, sex, and weight of your pet; and the symptoms the animal is displaying. You'll also be asked to provide your name, address, phone number and credit card information.
